



Tourism Businesses in Australia

June 2025



Tourism business numbers have remained relatively stable from 2022 to 2025

Tourism-related businesses reached an all-time high of 361,270 in June 2025. This was 0.1% higher than June 2024 and 8% higher than June 2020.

Data sources and definitions

A **Tourism characteristic industry** is an industry that is reliant on tourism, with at least 25 per cent of its output consumed by visitors. For example: accommodation.

A **Tourism connected industry** is an industry where the products are consumed by visitors in volumes which are significant for the visitor and/or the producer, yet do not account for at least 25 per cent of its consumed output. For example: automotive fuel retailing.

This information is derived from the ABS Business Register database, based on selected businesses from tourism-related industries as defined in the ABS Tourism Satellite Account.

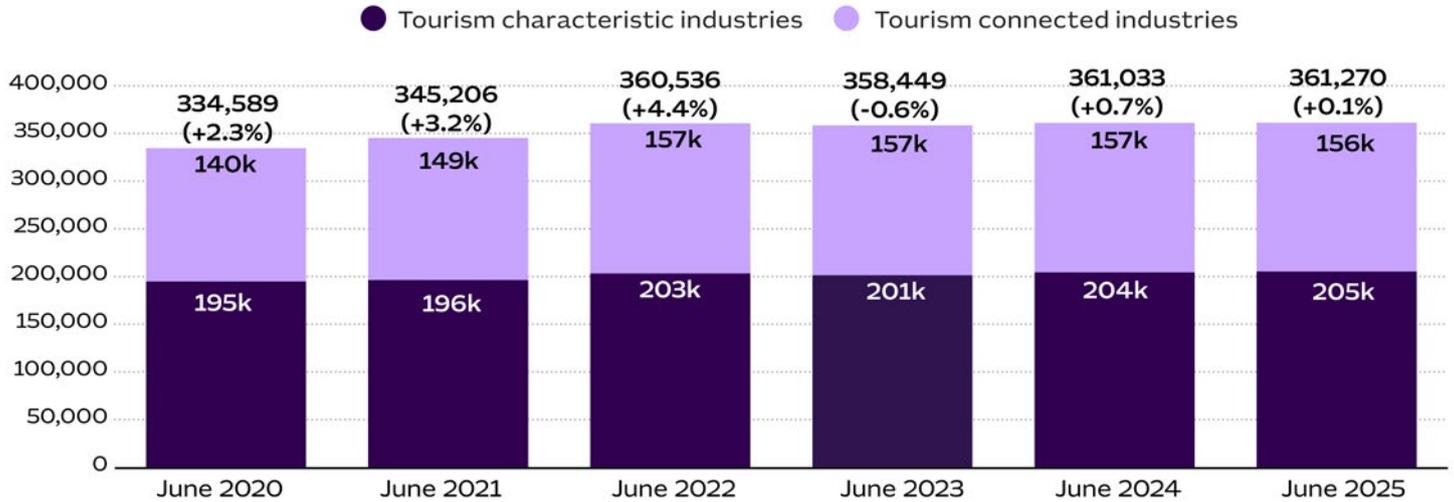

Number of tourism-related businesses

- Total tourism-related business numbers grew by 8% from 335,000 in 2020 to 361,000 in 2025.
- However, the number remained relatively stable (at around 361,000) between June 2022 and June 2025.



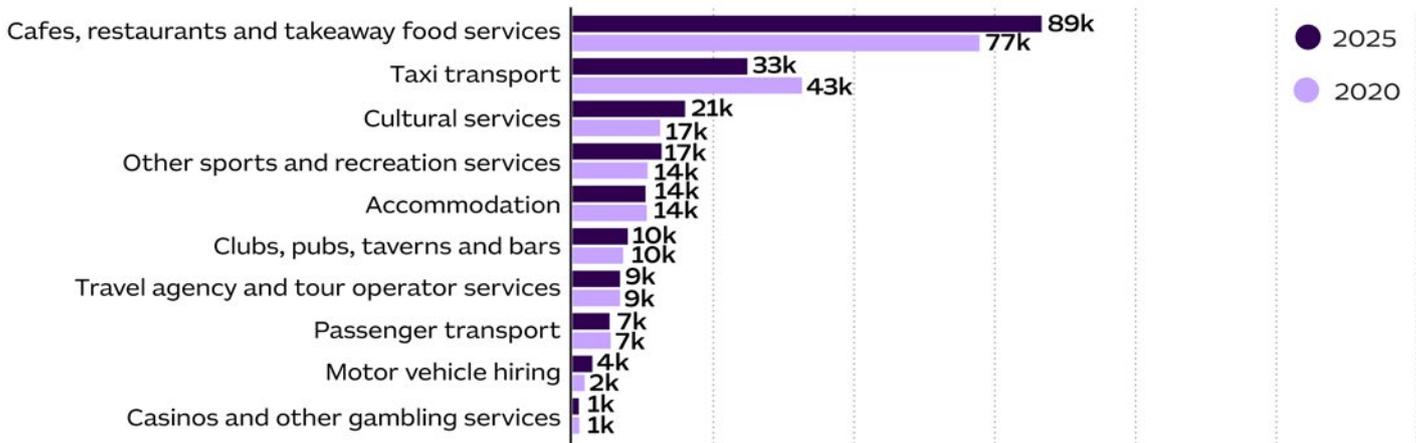

Industries of tourism-related businesses in June 2025

- The tourism-related industry with the largest number of businesses was retail trade (excl. automotive fuel retail) (152,000 businesses).
- The tourism characteristic industry with the largest number of businesses was cafés, restaurants and takeaway food services (89,000 businesses).
- The industry with the highest rate of growth in business numbers was motor vehicle hiring (64% growth between 2020 and 2025).
- The industry with the lowest rate of growth (largest contraction) was the taxi transport industry (24% contraction between 2020 and 2025).

Tourism-characteristic industries



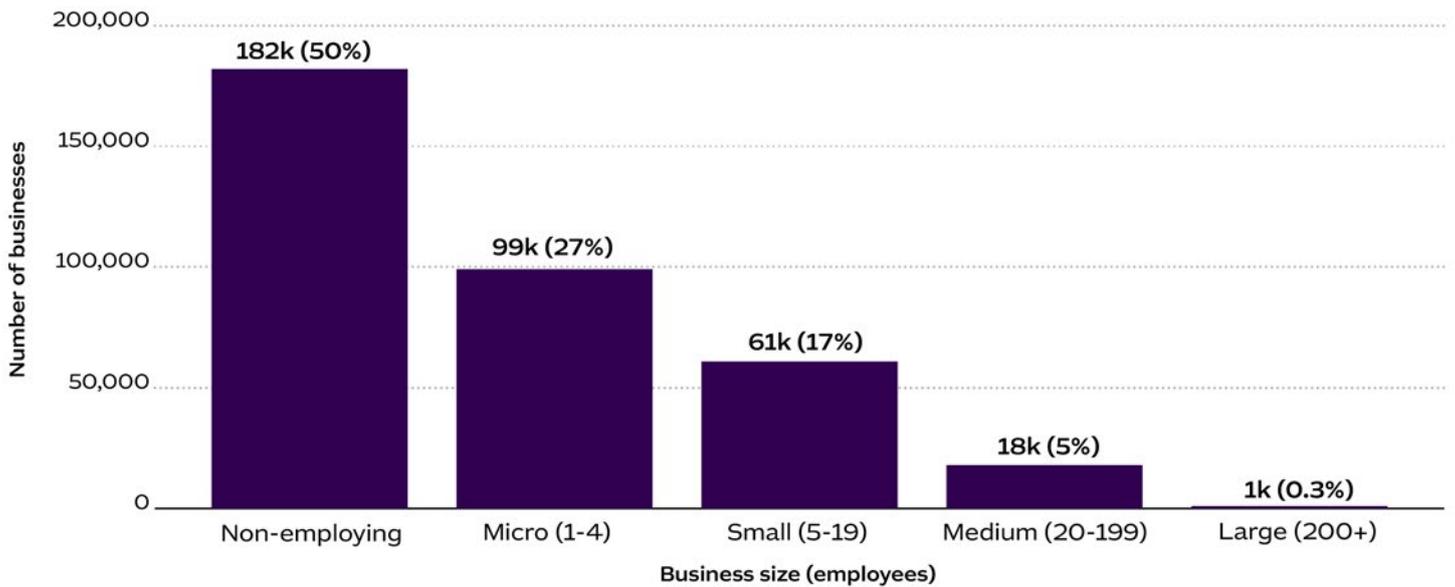

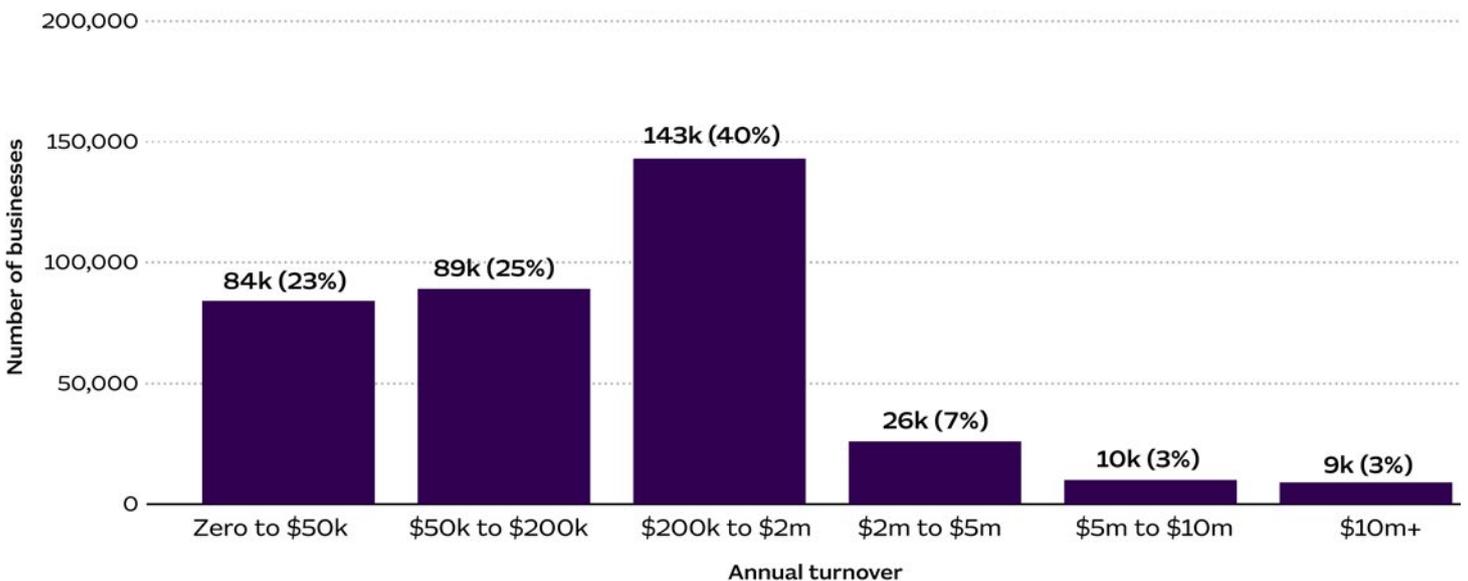
Tourism-related businesses by size in June 2025

- 4 in 5 (78%) of tourism-related businesses were micro (<5 employees) or non-employing businesses.
- 1 in 20 (5%) of tourism-related businesses were medium or large businesses, higher than the average (3%) for all Australian industries.



Tourism-related businesses by turnover in June 2025

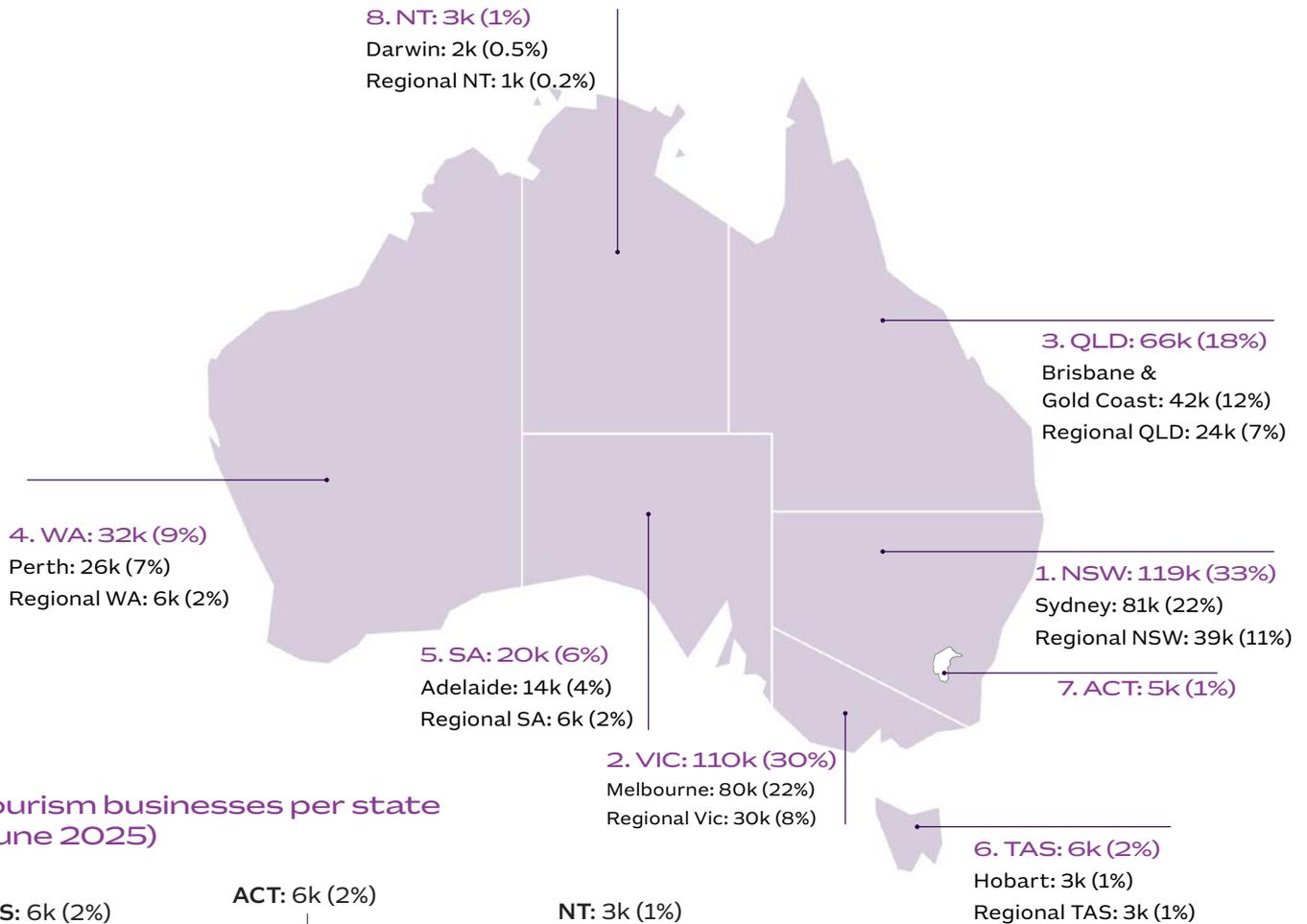
- Almost half (48%) of tourism-related businesses had a turnover of under \$200,000 (compared with 56% for all industries).
- 1 in 20 (5%) of tourism-related businesses had a turnover of more than \$5 million (compared with 4% for all industries).



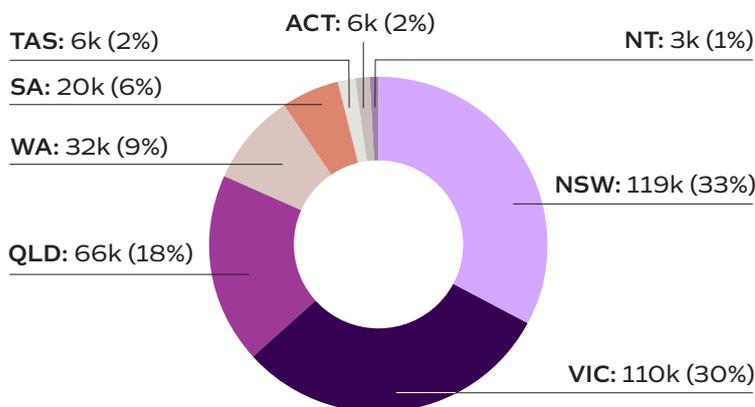


Location of tourism-related businesses in June 2025

- 7 in 10 (70% or 254,000) of tourism-related businesses were in Australia’s capital cities or the Gold Coast.
- 3 in 10 (30% or 107,000) were in regional Australia.
- NSW was home to 33% of Australia’s tourism-related businesses (119,000).
- The top 3 states (NSW, Victoria and Queensland) together accounted for 82% of tourism-related businesses.
